DERBY REFUGEE FORUM - Manager's Report

2015-2016 has been another very challenging year for Derby Refugee Advice Centre. We have had over 3,000 visits to the 'drop in' than 700 clients. from more There have been an increasing number of asylum appeals and asylum support issues for those going through the asylum process as well as benefit, National Insurance number and accommodation problems for new refugees. We are also seeing an increase in destitution. This has been coupled with a loss of Derby City Council funding and more difficulty accessing national support organisations.

We are applying for new funding from the Police and Crime Commissioner Grant, New Beginnings, Lottery People's Project and Foundation Derbyshire who have already granted £1000. We have received around £6,000 in donations from many very generous benefactors including local churches and community groups.

Burton & Burton and Duncan Lewis solicitors have sessions here with Rakiba on a Tuesday and Gurpinder on a Thursday. This is an incredibly useful service and enables people to access legal advice quickly




Derby Bosnia-Herzegovina Community Association once again took vital part in marking a refugee week.





We continued to receive funding from more than one sources. The Big Lottery Reaching Communities Fund was a core funding. For 7 months we also have been supported from DCCG as match funding to the whole Project. During the year we have had funding from Heritage Lottery Fund, which has finished by the end of financial year. The Project has been very successful. BBC Children in Need was very supportive to our Saturday Children Activities for the last several years, but we have failed to provide funding for the year 2016-2017. We also have managed to raise funding from other sources: hiring centre, subscription, donations, etc. in around £9500, keeping on track with planned long term objectives. We keep our financial sustainability very healthy.



The expenditure looks like the previous year apart from staff cost for the HLF Project. The staff were responsible for whole work done for 5 different projects. The salary has been funded from three sources of funding showing the link between Funding and Project. The expenditure was kept to the minimum level. The building expenditure was planned as part of Projects delivery, including Heating, lighting, Water and Maintenance which were lower than planned due to saving energy and no wasting money on maintenance and by doing a lot voluntarily. Finances were examined by Derby Community Accountancy Services and the Annual Return to the Charity Commission will be submitted after AGM. We are satisfied with the level of spending comparing to the work carried out, according to external monitoring report.

OUR MISSION AND VISION

Our mission and aim is to provide support and confidential service to elevate effects of poverty, sickness and distress of Refugees from Bosnia-Herzegovina and from the Former Yugoslavia and others, regardless of their ethnic origin and background. We believe that all refugees have the right to live in a just and equal society. We aim to achieve this by providing information, support, training and educational opportunity for all of them.

Aims and Objectives

- to provide practical and social support to all refugees and others from Bosnia and Herzegovina and Former Yugoslavia, now settled in East Midlands.
- to provide advice services, support and a confidential information
- to elevate effects of poverty and distress to Refugees mainly from Bosnia-Herzegovina and refugees from the Former Yugoslavia, regardless of their ethnic origin residing in East Midlands.
- to equally provide independent and impartial advice and support those mentioned above people, who are on benefits or low income, disable, elderly and vulnerable, residing in East Midlands.
- further development of the B-H Community Centre as a "One Stop Shop" place, as an efficient service for the Refugees and Asylum Seekers from all over the World.
