BRIEF HISTORY OF DERBY BOSNIA-HERZEGOVINA COMMUNITY ASSOCIATION

On the initiative of Bosnian refugees sheltered from the war in Bosnia and Herzegovina, ex camp prisoners and their families, medical evacuees and others in 1994, work on establishing

organization started in order to improve difficult situation of refugees from Bosnia and Herzegovina.

Association was established in January 1995, and registered as Charity in 1998.

Former premises were secured using acquired grant from Lottery coupled by great voluntary work of Bosnia and Herzegovina refugees set-

tled in Derby. Centre was officially opened in 2001. It was a place of gathering for Bosnians & Herzegovinians and others from ex-Yugoslavia that wanted to socialise and seek advice.

We have managed to start "One Stop Shop" in order to provide full set of different services via our partners organisations, Derby Refugee Forum and NCISE. It is necessary and vital for our "One Stop Shop" to be open to all people and on daily basis for clients irrelevant of securing the necessary core funding for work-place or not.

Chair Summary

As we bring to a close year 2017, we reflect back on the work that was carried out at the Bosnia Community Centre this year. It is extraordinary that 11,162 people visited the centre this year for various reasons. Some 4,427 of those sought help through an advice session from the DBHCA (1,084) and DRAC (3,343).



We welcomed people from all walks of life and different ethnic backgrounds who sought advice in respect of employment benefits, housing and council tax benefits, immigration, help with letter translation as well as interpretation appointments outside of the centre and other personal issues that do not fall under either of the afore mentioned areas. Furthermore, our invaluable outreach workers made 374 visits to people who sought help outside of the centre.

We have continued with the activities provided every Saturday funded by BBC Children In Need. Our funding came to an end last year and before the new funding was approved in May 2017, the Centre has used very small reserves in order to continue providing the Saturday activities for children. We are pleased that BBC Children in Need have made a decision to provide funding to us for one more year and this is due to end on 30th April 2018.

We congratulate our seven pupils who graduated from the Bosnian School this year and welcome 29 children who continue with the Bosnian School.

We have continued to provide dance classes to children every Friday evening and currently have 18 children in the group. Children who are in the dance group have attended various performances this year, such as QUAD for the Holocaust Memorial Day, Refugee Performance Week, Supplementary School performance, and Further from the Sea festival.

The Centre has organised various events through the year which have had a good attendance levels from the local community, the Mayor and various Council members. These events included Holocaust Memorial Day, Srebrenica Memorial, End of Heritage Project Celebration, Museum and Art Gallery Exhibition, AGM, Refugee

Week Exhibition, Visit from the supplementary school Birmingham, New Year party and presents for the children, Partners DRFT and UK Network.

Current committee consists of 15 members who have met every quarter with the Project Centre Manager and continue to play a vital role in the good governance of our charitable organisation.

It is evident from the number of visitors that come to the Centre to seek help how important the Centre is and the work that is done by the staff and volunteers of the Centre and the Derby Refugee Forum. We have seen a decrease in the funding available to support our charitable work, and have had to rely on our small reserves to keep the work going. This year, we must continue to seek other avenues of funding so that our work can continue.

On behalf of myself and the committee members I would like to thank our staff and volunteers for their hard work and commitment this year. I would also like to thank the staff and volunteers at the Derby Refugee Forum for all of the work and commitment they provide on a daily basis. I was fortunate to sit in one of the sessions with one of the volunteers this year and I was amazed by the patience and support given by the volunteers to people who rely on them to help them. All the staff and the volunteers do an amazing job and I hope that we can continue to source funding in the future to keep this work going.

Once again many thanks to everyone and I hereby propose the adoption of the Annual Return 2016-2017.

ONE-STOP-SHOP | Our Network Partners

Chair Summary - Derby Refugee Forum

2016-2017 has been a very busy, demanding but also an uplifting year for Derby Refugee Advice Centre. We have had 3343 visits to the 'drop in' from various clients. The main issues for advice sessions are still asylum seeker support and immigration matters and benefit concerns for refugees. Destitution for failed asylum seekers in the long term and for new refugees in the short term is a growing problem.



We are working constructively with other organisations, especially the Red Cross and others within City of Sanctuary to give a co ordinated response. There will also be challenges when the new Initial Accommodation at Laverstoke Court opens in January.

Ruth Long, Volunteer Coordinator and Admin Officer started in January. She quickly became an integral part of the Centre and has set up a wide variety of activities including creative art, 'Well for Life' health checks, sessions with Police and Fire Services, football, gym passes, theatre sessions, museum and school visits, massage therapy and board games. Those who use our Centre hopefully feel welcome, engaged, relaxed and as well as receiving advice if needed can socialise, be creative, learn and become more independent. English classes on Tuesday and Thursdays and Life in the UK/English on Mondays are flourishing.

We currently have about 50 volunteers, many of whom are asylum seekers or refugees. Everyone who volunteers at the Centre is part of a wonderful team of people who give so much time, effort and commitment. I cannot say a big enough thank you.

Being able to access legal advice is an extremely important for asylum seekers and we currently have Shabina from Burton & Burton and Ruth from Immigration Advice Service (IAS) on alternate Tuesdays, plus Julius from IAS every other Thursday, thus providing quite comprehensive legal support on site.

Funding from All Saints Trust £4,000, Allen Lane Foundation £5,000, Foundation Derbyshire, £4,500 and most recently Yapp £3,000 a year for 3 years provides a very positive base for our services. We have also received over £8,000 in donations from many very generous benefactors including local churches and community groups.

As always we are incredibly grateful to the Bosnia & Herzegovina Centre for their facilities, support and advice alongside financial and organisational help. Ferid and Nedzad are the cornerstone of our provision and together I hope we make a positive difference to the lives of asylum seekers and refugees in Derby.

BBC Children in Need | Helping Children and Young People

During the last twelve months, Derby Bosnia-Herzegovina Community Association continued with the Saturday activities for children and young people. This project was partly supported by Derby Bosnia-Herzegovina Community Association and partly by the BBC Children in Need.

The effort we put in organizing these activities is because we consider it absolutely necessary that our children here in Derby have the opportunity to attend additional activities/ classes in their native language. This project helps young people develop a lasting and profound interest in their homeland of Bosnia-Herzegovina and its people, towards the birthplace, preservation and enrichment of the mother tongue in all forms, introduction to geographical and other characteristics of our country, learning about cultural and other achievements of our homeland and promoting tolerance and mutual respect amongst all the people. It also helps children with their mainstream education and prepares them from an early age to understand and better fit into British society and culture.

Most of the children enrolled were aged between 5 and 15, all eager to take up opportunities to learn about their homeland as well as develop new skills which will help them in future. The aim of this project is to preserve our community's heritage and to raise the attainment of our children.

20 children were enrolled during the 2016/2017 academic year. They all attended Saturday Activities, every Saturday, for two hours.

In order to offer a quality service to our pupils, we continued with two groups. Alma Hrncic provided teaching for preschool children through to year 3 and Azra Basic, supported by Amela Zahirovic took charge of years 4 to 8.

We would like to stress out that all those who work with children have been checked by the Disclosure and Barring Service (DBS).



We would like to say a big thank you to all the parents for providing support in a form cleaning premises after activities took place.

Following on a success from previous years, we offered work placement to a student from the University of Derby. Janine Castellon spent ten weeks with us during the first three months of 2017. While completing ten workshops, Janine demonstrated exceptional skills of working with children.

In July, our pupils attended the annual Supplementary School Gathering event which took place in Birmingham. We are pleased to announce that our school took first place in all competitions, winning gold in literacy, art and football tournament.

PRE-SCHOOL ACTIVITY



2016/2017 Academic Year remained low in terms of children who attend pre-school activities, however, we saw an increase on previous years.


During the last 12 months, we have offered a range of structured educational experiences based on learning through the play. The activities have involved play with mix of toys, games, singing, story-time, reading and painting.

Pre-school gives children a chance to interact with others. Interacting with other children means learning basic discipline. Young children learn social skills when they interact with other children. These skills are critical to developing personality.

Exhibition was organized by our Community Association in co-operation with Derby Museums and its aim was to present our culture and heritage to the people of Derby and wider. It was an afternoon of music, dancing, crafts and food celebrating Bosnia-Herzegovina Culture and Heritage.

Samples of traditional dishes were prepared and served by the members of our Community. Visitors were able to make their own Bosnian - inspired crafts while our traditional dance group "Bosnian Pearls" entertained them with traditional dances throughout the afternoon.

Our new film, "Our Life, Our Transition" was screened throughout the afternoon and the accompanying book, "My True Story" was on display.

In July 2017, DBHCA organised a party for all those who attended Saturday activities. On top of that, seven children who spent many years with us and came to an end of their studies were treated with a surprise Limousine.



Holocaust Memorial Day 2017



On Thursday, 26th of January 2017, Derby Bosnia and Herzegovina Community Association marked the Holocaust Memorial Day, the Day of remembrance of all those innocent victims from WW2 and all victims from conflicts after that, including victims from Bosnian civil war.

With this year's theme being "How Can Life Go On", we took the opportunity to remind people about the atrocities that happened in our homeland with the main emphasis on Srebrenica Genocide which marked its 22nd anniversary this year.

Our event was attended by the Mayor of the City of Derby, chancellor Linda Winter, High Sheriff of Derbyshire, Elizabeth J. Fothergill CBE, representative from the Ukrainian Embassy and many others.

New Year's Presents

Derby Bosnia-Herzegovina Community Association once again took vital part in marking a refugee week.


We had an exhibition set up at our Centre which was in place for one week. Additionally, our dance group "Bosnian Pearls"






Finances | 2016-2017








The expenditure came in at much lower then the previous year, but this is down to the HLF Project costs accumulated during the 2015/2016 year. The expenditure was kept to the minimum level. The building expenditure was planned as part of Projects delivery, including Heating, lighting, Water and Maintenance which were lower than planned due to saving energy and no wasting money on maintenance and by doing a lot voluntarily. Finances were examined by Derby Community Accountancy Services and the Annual Return to the Charity Commission will be submitted after AGM. We are satisfied with the level of spending comparing to the work carried out, according to external monitoring report.



Outreach Worker's Remarks


Year 2016/2017 turned out to be busy but very successful. Ermina Zahirovic-Algie provided outreach work from the start of the third project year in September 2016 till middle of July 2017, when Ermina decided to pursue her career elsewhere. I wish Ermina every success in all her future endeavours.

During the third year of the project, Outreach worker regularly visited and helped 17 families and 37 individuals. 371 outreach visits took place during this time, spending more then 450 hours altogether.


