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BRIEF HISTORY OF DERBY BOSNIA-HERZEGOVINA COMMUNITY ASSOCIATION



On the initiative of Bosnian refugees sheltered from the war in Bosnia and Herzegovina, ex camp prisoners and their families, medical evacuees and others in 1994, work on establishing organization

started in order to improve difficult situation of refugees from Bosnia and Herzegovina.

Association was established in January 1995, and registered as Charity in 1998. Former premises were secured using acquired grant from Lottery coupled by great voluntary work Derby Refugee Forum and of Bosnia and Herzegovina refugees settled in Derby. Centre was officially opened in 2001.

It was a place of gathering for

Bosnians & Herzegovinians and others from ex-Yugoslavia that wanted to socialise and seek advice.

We have managed to start "One Stop Shop" in order to provide full set of different services via our partners organisations, NCISE. It is necessary and vital for our "One Stop Shop" to be open to all people and on daily basis for clients irrelevant of securing the necessary core funding for workplace or not.

Chair Summary

As we bring to a close year 2018, we reflect back on the work that was carried out at the Bosnia Community Centre this year. It is great to see that 11,805 people visited the Centre this year for various reasons. Some 4,116 of those sought help through an advice session from the DBHCA (1,027 of which 450 were outreach visits) and DRAC (3,089).



We welcomed people from all walks of life and different ethnic backgrounds who sought advice in respect of employment benefits, housing and council tax benefits, immigration, help with letter translation as well as interpretation appointments outside of the centre and other personal issues that do not fall under either of the afore mentioned areas.

We have continued with the activities provided every Saturday funded by BBC Children In Need. Our funding came to an end in April 2018 and although we made an application for further funding, this was rejected. We have applied again for funding for one year and currently await the decision. Since April 2018 we have supported the activities on Saturday through our own reserves. I am hopeful that the funding will be provided to us to ensure that we can continue with our activities on Saturday as the Centre's reserves cannot sustain those costs.

In partnership with UK Network, we secured funding in May 2018 from Dunhill Medical Trust. We are now working closely with St Mary's Hospice in Birmingham undergoing intense training to get equipped with the knowledge on how to provide excellent End of Life Care for All.

We congratulate one pupil who graduated from the Bosnian School this year and welcome 31 children who continue with the Bosnian School.

We have continued to provide dance classes to children every Friday evening and currently have 16 children in the group. Children who are in the dance group have attended various performances this year, such as QUAD for the Holocaust Memorial Day, Refugee Performance Week, Supplementary School performance, and at our AGM Meeting last year.

The Centre has organised various events through the year which have had good attendance levels from the local community, the Mayor and various Council

members. These events included Holocaust Memorial Day, Srebrenica Memorial held at the Derby City Council and at the Centre, Visit from the supplementary school Coventry, Debate held with Ramiz Salkic, New Year party and presents for the children. We also held a number of training events for our staff and volunteers including the Trustees.

Current committee consists of 16 members who have met every quarter with the Project Centre Manager and continue to play a vital role in the good governance of our charitable organisation.

The committee members have undertaken safeguarding training as recommended by the regulator, the Charity Commission, and have been heavily involved in the changes and compliance of the General Data Protection Regulations which came into force earlier this year.

It is evident from the number of visitors that come to the Centre to seek help how important the Centre is and the work that is done by the staff and volunteers of the Centre and the Derby Refugee Forum. We continue to see a decrease in the funding available to support our charitable work, and have had to rely on our small reserves to keep the work going. We must continue to seek other avenues of funding so that our work can continue.

On behalf of myself and the committee members I would like to thank our staff and volunteers for their hard work and commitment this year. All the staff and the volunteers do an amazing job and I hope that we can continue to source funding in the future to keep this work going.

Once again many thanks to everyone and I hereby propose the adoption of the Annual Return 2017-2018.

DERBY REFUGEE FORUM | Our Network Partner

Chair Summary - Derby Refugee Forum

During 2017-2018 we have worked hard at Derby Refugee Advice Centre (DRAC) to try and continue developing actions, activities and strategies that enable asylum seekers and refugees to contribute to and benefit from, a wide range of support services.

We have a strong and stable team of over 40 volunteers who are involved in advice sessions, interpreting, teaching Maths and English, leading creative activities, shopping, supporting Reception, IT input and production of statistics, making drinks and distributing food in the kitchen and general cleaning. Everyone's input is incredibly valuable and contributes to a positive, friendly and welcoming atmosphere.

Over the year we have carried out 2489 advice sessions with 733 different clients from 44 nationalities. For asylum seekers the main areas of support required in advice sessions are asylum support i.e. aspen card not functioning or concerns with housing; immigration when we are able to refer them through to either Burton & Burton or Immigration Advice Service solicitors who came to DRAC on a weekly alternate basis - and health and destitution. For refugees the most frequent requests are for benefits and housing advice as well as help with general essential services like gas, electricity and mobile phone contracts and bills. We now have an agreement with Derby City Council where we support anyone who gets refugee status in Derby to access the appropriate benefits, apply for housing, prepare for employment and to move towards independence.

Ruth our Volunteer Coordinator and Admin Officer continues to develop a stimulating and exciting range of creative, educational and practical workshops and activities, both inside the Centre and externally. These include artistic sessions, health and safety, public service and private sector recruitment, theatre, music, the local museum, the library and school visits. We



have a very positive relationship with Crich Junior School and an excellent rapport has been established between the children, staff and many who use our Centre. Learning about life in the UK and helping people be active members of their local community is very important and Ruth is building new and constructive relationships with many organisations.

DRAC is one of many organisations in Derby who support refugees and asylum seekers in different ways, generally under the umbrella of the City of Sanctuary group. We aim to liaise, cooperate and share information and skills to the benefit of all. Our links with the British Red Cross are strong with an effective cross referral system, also with Upbeat Communities, Derbyshire Refugee Solidarity, Metropolitan and Arimathea Housing, STAR at Derby University and many other active groups.

Funding from All Saints Trust of £2000, YAPP Charitable Trust £3000, the Hilden Charitable Fund £6000 and Mugginton Parochial Church £2000 as well as many other individual donations enabled us to carry on our work. Thank you so much to everyone.

We could do none of this without the incredible support of the Bosnia Herzegovina Centre. They are the rock on which we build. Their knowledge and understanding of the world of refugees and asylum seekers enables us to learn and move forward. Thank you Ferid and Nedzad for providing us with so much practical, organisational and financial support. It leads to something very special.

SATURDAY ACTIVITIES | Helping Children and Young People

Teacher's Remarks

One of the key objectives of Derby Bosnia-Herzegovina Community Association is to continue to provide mother-tongue classes in Bosnian concentrating on language, core curriculum and cultural activities alongside activities such as music and dance.

Wherever possible we concentrate on making link with National Curriculum and supporting pupils' overall attainment and progress, however we also recognise that the impact of supplementary school on our pupils is not limited to their academic attainment, and indeed, there may be many wider benefits to their confidence, well-being, development of character and skills which are likely to be as important to the pupils and their parents.

The main aim continues to be preserving our community's heritage and incorporating it into our British way of life. We are still managed and run by our community members, on voluntary basis, and we teach children from a range of age groups, from pre-school to young adults. All of those involved in working with our pupils have been subject to Disclosure and Barring Service (DBS) checks.

We have introduced 'open classroom' policy where parents can watch their children being taught and participate or help with any classroom activities. Progress is key and so far, evidence shows, this is a great initiative and each pupil is making progress on their individual learning journey.

In order to continue meeting the needs of our children we resume to work with two groups. Alma Hrncic provided teaching for preschool children through to year 4 and Azra Basic, supported by Amela Zahirovic took charge of years 5 to 8.





In July, our pupils attended the annual Supplementary School Gathering event which took place in Hertfordshire.



We continued with our close working relationship with the University of Derby, offering work experience placement for two students who spent 15 weeks with us.

For our preschool children, we continue to offer a range of structured educational experiences based on learning through the play. The activities have involved play with mix of toys, games, singing, reading and painting.

Pre-school gives children a chance to interact with others. Interacting with other children means learning basic discipline. Young children learn social skills when they interact with other children.

31 children were enrolled during the 2017/2018 academic year. They all attended Saturday Activities, every Saturday, for two hours.

Traditionally, we continued with our performances at the Bosnian Supplementary School gatherings which took part in Hertfordshire this year. We also took part in marking this years Holocaust Memorial Day as well as Refugee Week. Performances took place to mark National Day of Bosnia and Herzegovina and the Independence Day celebrations at the premises of Bosnia UK Network in Birmingham.





Classes are held every Friday from 17:30 till 19:30 and everyone is welcome to join. It's a relaxed atmosphere where we all join in at times from the age of 5 to 65. We all sing and dance together.

OUTREACH WORK | Helping Elderly and Frail

Outreach Worker's Remarks


2017/2018 turned out to be very busy, enjoyable and, at times, challenging year. We continued to support our elderly and frail members of the community as well as those who are unable to come to the Centre due to their mobility issues or other health reasons.



During the year four of the project, 450 outreach visits were carried out to 43 different families. 347 of those were home visits to 26 different families. The remaining 103 outreach services were in a form of interpreting or representation at Schools, GP Surgeries, Hospitals and other local agencies, spending an estimated 350 hours during the 12 month period.

Majority of clients live in Derby, however, few of them live in Nottingham. They are all of different age groups, gender and beliefs, however, most of them are elderly and members of Bosnian Roma Community, many of whom suffer from various levels of physical or mental health issues.

Support was provided in many different areas; interpreting, giving relevant advice, providing a listening ear and understanding their concerns, making telephone calls on their behalf, filling forms, liaising with local authorities, GP's, housing associations, schools, health professionals, pharmacies and care agencies.



I'm very pleased to say that, so far, current project year has been as successful and I look forward to continuing to deliver the excellent level of service that our organisation has been doing for the past few years.

Srebrenica Memorial Day 2018

First event took place n 6th July 2018 at the premises of Derby City Council and was organised by Charity Organisation Remembering Srebrenica, our Community Association and Derby City Council themselves.



The event featured, speeches, survivor testimonies, pledges and refreshments, bringing together not only members from the Bosnian community but also wider population, including Dr Waqar Azmi, chairman of Remembering Srebrenica, Gary Robinson, Cohesion and Integration Officer at Derby City Council and others.

Second event was marked on 8th July at our own Bosnia & Herzegovina Centre and was attended mainly by local members of our community. Event featured prayers, speeches and flower laying on the monument outside the Centre.

Turnout was very good and a new committee of sixteen members was elected which is the largest committee we have had since the establishment of our organisation.







Balance Sheet

We continued to receive funding from more than one sources. The Big Lottery Reaching Communities Fund was a core funding. BBC Children in Need was very supportive to our Saturday Children Activities for the last several years, but we have failed to provide further funding. We have managed to raise funding from other sources: hiring centre, subscription, fundraising, etc. in around £18,863, keeping on track with planned long term objectives. We continue to keep our financial sustainability very healthy.

The expenditure came around £2,500 higher then the previous year. This is mainly down to annual salary increases, but also, more was spent on travel expenses then the previous year. The expenditure was kept to the minimum level possible. The building expenditure was planned as part of Projects delivery. Finances were examined by Derby Community Accountancy Services and the Annual Return to the Charity Commission will be submitted after AGM. We are satisfied with the level of spending comparing to the work carried out, according to external monitoring report.




